



There isn't a thing the committee could have done better. I just wish it lasted a week so I could have spent time reading all the wonderful historical presentations word for word.







Awards Luncheon-

After a short break, we all sat down to a fabulous King Salmon lunch. Steamboat presented the Western Heritage Skisport Award to Ingrid Wicken for establishing the California Ski Library. Aspen/Snowmass presented the annual safety award to **T.J. Barnes**, San Diego. The first highlight of the day was the wonderful presentation of Ansel Adams' early photographs by his son, Dr. Michael Adams. Lunch was sponsored by Intrawest Destination **Resorts** and the fine ale was again donated by Firestone Walker Brewery Company.

History Reception & Reunion-

The activities after lunch were a departure from the typical convention faire as this time was dedicated to a celebration of ski history. We began with a "reception and reunion" where everyone was given a chance to renew old acquaintances and remember when. The history exhibits were still available for viewing.

The reunion was followed by a multimedia presentation orchestrated by **Steve Coxen** where clips were shown of our very special guests— **Jimmie Heuga** & **Billy Kidd** [the first American men to win Olympic medals in alpine skiing], **Chris Davenport**, **Glen Plake** & **Bob Salerno** [our extreme skiing trio], and **Deb Armstrong** ['84 Olympic gold medalist]. There were also clips of the Tenth Mountain Division and Goofy's "The Art of Skiing", a cartoon previewed at the Far West Convention in 1941. The Multi-media presentation was sponsored by **Ski Big 3—Banff, Lake Louise, Sunshine**. The fabulous desserts were provided by **Aspen/Snowmass** and the ice sculpture for our mango martinis was donated by **Finlandia Vodka**.

The final hour [or two] was spent in a choice of four informal presentations. Jimmie Heuga, Billy Kidd and Doug Pringle met to discuss "Ski Challenges." John Watson hosted a session on "Growing up in Far West." Richard Kun, Snow Summit President, and Doug Pfeiffer, former Snow Summit ski instructor, discussed "Ski Area Development in the Far West." 

HEALTH, FITNESS & SAFETY-

Heat Illness Prevention—

With warmer temperatures, heat-related illnesses like heat exhaustion and heat stroke become more of a concern. These conditions may appear after exposure to high temperatures and inadequate intake of fluids.

Normally the body cools itself by sweating. During heat waves or high temperatures the body's temperature control system can become overloaded and sweating is not enough. Another factor that can affect the body's ability to cool itself is high humidity when sweat will not evaporate as quickly, preventing the body from releasing heat. Other conditions that limit the body's ability to regulate temperature are old age, fever, obesity,

dehydration, heart disease, poor circulation, sunburn, or drug and alcohol use.

Heat exhaustion-

Heat exhaustion develops after several days of exposure to high temperatures and inadequate or unbalanced replacement of fluids. The people most prone are the elderly, those with high blood pressure or working out in a hot environment.

Signs of heat exhaustion are heavy sweating, paleness, muscle cramps, tiredness, dizziness, headache, nausea, and/or fainting. The person's pulse or heart rate may be fast and weak, and breathing may become fast and shallow. If left untreated this may lead to heat stroke.

Heat Stroke—

A heat stroke can occur when the body temperature rises rapidly, 106°F or higher, within 10-15 minutes. Heat stroke can cause death or permanent damage if not treated immediately.

The warning signs of heat stroke are extremely high temperature; red, hot and dry skin; rapid, strong pulse; headache; dizziness; nausea; confusion; or unconsciousness.

Prevention-

Increase fluid intake during hot temperatures by two to four glasses of **cool** fluids each hour. Cold beverages can cause stomach cramps and alcohol will cause you to lose more fluid. If you think you have a heat illness take a cool shower or get into an air-conditioned environment. A heat stroke is a medical emergency.

SAFE CYCLING—

With the Tour de France in full swing, many of us are inspired to dust off our bikes and start cycling once again. Cycling is one of the safest sports. However, there are some basic rules which every cyclist should know and obey.

- 1. Observe all traffic regulations including red and green lights, one way streets, and stop signs.
- 2. Keep to the right and ride in a straight line. Always ride in single file.
- 3. For night riding, have a white light on the front of your bike and a state approved red reflector in the rear.
- 4. Have a satisfactory bell or buzzer to warn others of your approach.
 - 5. Give pedestrians the right of way.
 - 6. Watch out for cars pulling out or doors opening unexpectedly.
 - 7. Never hitch rides—holding on to a moving vehicle while riding is extremely dangerous. Never do stunts.
 - 8. Never carry other riders. Don't carry packages that obstruct vision or prevent proper control of bike.
 - 9. Be sure your brakes work efficiently and safely and don't squeak. Get your bike tuned annually.
 - 10. Be cautious at intersections. Slow down and look to the right and the left before crossing.
 - I1. Always use proper hand signals for turning and stopping.
- 12. Never weave or swerve as unexpected moves cause accidents.
- 13. Wear a helmet. **

Kicking Horse Begins \$25 Million Upgrade—

Kicking Horse Mountain Resort in British Columbia, Canada has \$25 million in mountain enhancement projects now underway in the continued development of the mountain and Resort Village.

Of the \$25 million, \$21 million is being invested in on-going real estate projects including the Selkirk Resort Homes and Palliser Lodge as well as continuing individual single family homes construction.

An additional \$4 million is being invested in mountain infrastructure to enhance the year-round guest experience.

California Resorts Post Record Season—

Prodigious and early snowfall helped lift California ski areas to record visits of 8.1 million, far surpassing the previous mark of 7.6 million recorded in the 1997-98 El Nino season.

Among individual areas— Heavenly, Kirkwood and Sierraat-Tahoe— contributed to the record year.

Southern California, led by Mountain High, also posted strong numbers.

Big Sky and Moonlight to Offer Combined Lift Ticket—

Big Sky Resort and its new neighbor on Lone Peak, Moonlight Basin, will give visitors next winter the option to purchase tickets and passes allowing unlimited access to both resorts. The resorts shared several trails and a lift in the past. But previously, it was necessary to purchase a ticket or season pass from each if you wanted to ski them both.

Combined, the two trail networks offer nearly 5,300 acres of skiable terrain and the second-biggest vertical descent in the US at 4,350 feet.

The combined pass will also provide lift access to hundreds of acres of summit snowfields that were previously accessible only by hiking. Between them, the two resorts operate 23 lifts.

Jackson Hole to Retire Aerial Tram—

Jackson Hole Mountain Resort will retire its Aerial Tramway, estimated to have carried over 2 million passengers, winter and summer, since 1966, in September 2006.

While a replacement for the lift has not yet been determined, the resort is considering several alternatives for replacing its iconic tram.

Wyoming Resort for Sale at \$20 Million—

The Big Horn Mountain Resorts—consisting of Big Horn Ski Resort and its sister resorts Meadowlark Lake Resort and Deer Haven Resort—are for sale, with the price set at \$20 million. The sale price includes all the buildings, equipment, inventory, liquor licenses, vehicles, and rental gear at all three resorts. The owner is said to need cash to pay off a sudden debt.

Located in central Wyoming on 400-acre Meadowlark Lake, the Big Horn Ski Resort has 1,000 vertical rising from a base elevation of 8,300 feet. The

area has 14 trails and three lifts, including one double and one triple chair, with 55 percent of its 160 acres covered by snowmaking.

The area has also recently built a 10,000 square foot all-log lodge. Terrain mix is 30 percent novice, 40 percent intermediate, and

30 percent advanced. A new master plan calls for tripling the area's size; related to that, 700 hundred acres of developable land could also be made available to a buyer.

Colorado Resorts Post Third Best Season—

Colorado Ski Country USA reported their third best year ever as record numbers of international skiers and snowboarders (up 28%) helped drive visits to 11.81 million, up more than 550,000 from a year ago.

According to preliminary estimates, Colorado achieved a 6% gain in destination visits. Colorado accounted for 55% of the entire western United States' total destination skier visits.



Far West Rebuilt-

The conflict between USSA and Far West came to a head in the 80s. Following the


1983 USSA convention in Boston [referred to by some as the Boston Tea Party], USSA voted to de-emphasize their recreational programs and concentrate on supporting the US Ski Teams. The Amateur Athletic Act of 1978 was used to create a national governing body which required a focus on the national competitive effort. The United States Recreational Ski Association [USRSA] was founded as the national recreational organization and Far West withdrew from USSA to began rebuilding the association. Clubs were left to determine which association(s) they wanted to affiliate with -USSA, USRSA, and/or Far West.



On November 6, 1984, the Executive Committee of Far West met to decide on the direction the association should take. This committee proposed a new set of bylaws that were approved at the 53rd Annual Far West Convention held at the Oakland Airport Hilton, May 17-19, 1985. Far West was restored as an all-volunteer organization with Janie "Frankie" Hansen as president. To encourage clubs to stay with Far West, dues were waived and are not required by clubs as long as they belong to a member Council.

The Modern Far West—

As an all-volunteer organization without dues paying members, Far West had to figure out a way fund their numerous programs. The annual FWSA convention, hosted by Balboa Ski Club, held at the Irvine Hilton & Towers in Irvine, California on May 16-18, 1986 was historic. Special programs attracted a record number of delegates. More importantly, the first annual Silent Auction was introduced and managed by Jane Wyckoff. The continued success of this fund raiser set the stage for enabling financial support of Far West programs for the future.

The 90s saw the rebuilding of the Far West travel program by Gene Fulkerson with both domestic and international trips being offered. The pubic affairs program under Mike Sanford was rejuvenated and has assumed a significant role on the national stage on a wide variety of issues-area development, safety, transportation, insurance, taxation, consumer advocacy and snowsports history.

The council development program has had dramatic successes in the last decade. Arizona Ski Council and Northwest Ski Club Council Ithen Portland Area Ski Club Council or PASCC] joined Far West in 1991 and 1992, respectively. Meanwhile Sierra Council built a strong race program and in 1996 once again became actively involved in Far West. In 2000, New Mexico Council joined the association as the tenth council and Far West became one of the founding members of the National Ski Council Federation [NSCF].
